# 44 Ways to Make a Book Report

1. Give a written summary.
2. Write about the most important part.
3. Write the most interesting part. (Write in your own words.)
4. Read the most interesting part. (Be able to pronounce all the words.)
5. Tell what you liked or disliked about some of the characters.
6. Make a peep box of the most important part.
7. Design a book cover with an inside summary.
8. Build a model of an important object in the book.
9. Draw a clock showing the time that an important event occurred.
10. Create another ending for the story.
11. Make a "lost and found" ad for a person, pet, or object mentioned in the story.
12. Make a picture book of the most important part of the story.
13. Illustrate the most important part in cartoon form.
14. Paint a mural of the story or the parts in it.
15. Make a watercolor painting of the setting of the story.
16. Draw, paint, or color the main characters.
17. Compare the book with another you have read with a similar subject.
18. Produce a movie of the story.
19. Gather a collection of objects from the story.
20. Make a collage related to the story.
21. Put together a three dimensional scene from the book.
22. Make a poster to advertise the book.
23. Draw a map to show where the story takes place.
24. Write a brief biography of the author.
25. Give a chalk talk. (In our room it will be a dry erase board talk)
26. Make characters to use in a flannel board story.
27. Construct a wire mobile to illustrate your book.
28. Tape record and play back an interesting part of the book. (Make sure the recording is clear.)
29. Make a diorama.
30. Design and make stand-up characters.
31. Write a poem about the story.
32. Write a letter to a friend telling what you thought of the book.
33. Write a letter as if one character was corresponding to another.
34. Write a letter to one of the characters as if he or she was a friend.
35. Make-up a conversation between two characters in the story. (Each one should speak at least 5 times.)
36. Write an imaginary conversation between yourself and one of the characters. (Each one should speak at least 5 times.)
37. Draw a picture of the ending of the story and give it a title.
38. Make up a riddle or limerick about your story.
39. Make a story sequence chart with illustrations.
40. Prepare a newspaper article about a character's activities.
41. Choose two characters and tell how they met in the story.
42. Write a short play about one of the characters in trouble. Read it with someone.
43. Create a Power Point presentation about the book.
44. Create your own book report idea.
