



- 1. Objective D, "Ensure students are reading on grade level (3rd) and showing growth as it pertains to ELA": is this for 3rd grade only?
 - 1. YES- A KEY STATE MEASURE IS 3RD GRADERS READING ON GRADE LEVEL (GOAL IS 90%), MY THOUGHT IS IF WE CAN DRILL DOWN TO AT 3RD, THEN 4TH AND 5TH WILL SEE THE BENEFITS.
- 2. Objective E, "Make sure subgroups are making academic progress across all content areas" and Objective F, "Ensure Exceptional Education Students are making yearly gains in literacy rates and state targets for ELA, Math, and Science": I could not remember for certainty if Exceptional Education was a subgroup, but if so, seems that E covers everyone......F could be duplicative but understand if also want to specifically call it out to drive focus
 - 1. IT MAY APPEAR DUPLICATIVE HOWEVER, I BELIEVE IT IS IMPORTANT TO CALL OUT ALL STUDENTS WITH A SPECIFIC FOCUS ON SPECIAL ED (AKA EXCEPTIONAL ED). EXCEPTIONAL EDUCATION IS DEFINITELY A SUB GROUP AS 20% OF OUR SCHOOL IS EE
- 3. Objective J, "Increase the percentage of ED students scoring proficient and above on Ga Milestones": is ED referring to Exceptional Education?
 - 1. ED STANDS FOR ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED, ALSO AN UNDERPERFORMING SUB GROUP AND ALSO 20% OF OUR SCHOOL
 - Objective I, "Ensure all students are comfortable going to most or all adults in the school for help" and Objective L, "Establish mentors to support student connectedness to school and with a trusted adult": these two go hand in hand to me. I

struggled in ranking these......it would be interesting to know if there is correlation between the students who responded that they are not comfortable going to most/all adults in the survey the same as those who are not seeing as much academic growth / scoring lower on MAP, GA Milestones, etc. If so, I would likely rank this higher than I just submitted. My thoughts are that if the students don't feel comfortable at this young age and are already scoring below proficient, it would be extremely hard to help them grow academically without first establishing basic

- trust/safety/kindness.
- 2. GREAT CALL OUT, THEY DO GO HAND IN HAND. IT WOULD BE SAFE TO ASSUME THAT THOSE WHO ARE NOT COMFORTABLE GOING TO A TRUSTED ADULT AT SCOHOL ARE ALSO THOSE THAT STRUGGLE ACADEMICALLY, ARE ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED, AND PART OF A SUB GROUP. A ROBUST MENTOR PROGRAM MIGHT DRIVE ALL OF THESE LEVERS.

2025 CRPI Results

Dear Morris Brandon Families, Community Members, and Partners,

I am proud to share our College and Career Readiness Performance Index (CCRPI) results from the FY25 school year. CCRPI remains the state of Georgia's most comprehensive measure of school performance, offering a clear, consistent, and statewide look at student achievement, growth, and readiness. While no single overall score was issued this year, schools received ratings in four key areas. Below is a summary of our performance and the story it tells about our students, staff, and community.

CONTENT MASTERY - 97.9 / 100

Content Mastery reflects how well students are performing in core subjects and whether they are on track for the next grade level—and ultimately, college or career. This measure includes results from Georgia Milestones and the Georgia Alternate Assessment 2.0 (GAA 2.0) in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies.

Our students demonstrated exceptional achievement with:

- ELA: 100
- · Math: 100
- 5th Grade Science: 84.75

This score reflects the strong instructional foundation built by our teachers and supported by our families each day.

PROGRESS - 96.4 / 100

Progress measures student growth over time—how much students improved relative to academically similar peers. It also evaluates the advancement of our English Learners (ELs) toward language proficiency.

Kev highlights include:

- Over 72% of our 3rd-5th grade students demonstrated typical to high growth in ELA and Math.
- Our English Learners earned a score of 100 for outstanding progress in English language proficiency.

This score reflects not only strong instruction, but also the commitment of our students to grow and push themselves each day.

CLOSING THE GAPS - 75 / 100

Closing the Gaps evaluates how well all student groups are improving toward achievement targets. Targets increase annually when met, holding schools to a trajectory of continuous improvement.

Our results show:

 Several student groups met or exceeded targets, including our Special Education students, who surpassed state expectations in reading, math, and science.
